#### SESSION I CHANGING TRENDS IN THE REGION

A fresh look at the region is necessary. Fragmentations is ongoing, while traditional governments persist as well as low regional cooperation. At the same time the wave of normalisation accords and the recomposition of the Gulf Cooperation Council, together with a new Israeli government are signs of change. Also, great powers show different alignments with the USA reducing direct engagement and trying to avail itself more of NATO, while Beijing continues its economic expansion and Russia plays a more disruptive role. Is a positive trend in the offing? How could Allies' policies be in tune with the trend and better support the countries concerned?
